It is assumed that the family has Our Lady Queen of Peace parish connection and practices the faith by attending Sunday Mass on a weekly basis. Veiling of Images

Images in the church (including statues) may be covered from the 5th Sunday of Lent until the beginning of the Easter Vigil. "The practice of veiling images alerts us that something is different—it can be startling at first, but the last two weeks of Lent are a time of immediate preparation for the celebration of the Sacred Triduum. The veils are hard to miss and they serve as a reminder to get ready!

The veiled images build within us a longing for Easter Sunday The veils seem out of place, and even counterintuitive. It can seem strange that the crucifix is covered up during Passiontide. Through this absence of images, our senses are heightened and we become more aware of what is missing. Similarly, the suppression of the Alleluia during Lent effectively demonstrates that we are in exile from our true Home, where the angels sing Alleluia without ceasing.

When images are unveiled before the Easter Vigil, we are reminded that we, in a sense, live in a veiled world. It is through our own death that we are able to see our true home, and the veil is lifted. Christ lifts the veil through His Resurrection."

Importance of Holy Thursday - Mar. 28th, 2024

Except for the resurrection on Easter, Holy Thursday is possibly one of the most important, complex, and profound days of celebration in the Catholic Church. Holy Thursday celebrates the institution of the Eucharist as the true body and blood of Jesus Christ and the institution of the sacrament of the priesthood.

During the Last Supper, Jesus offers himself as the Passover sacrifice, the sacrificial lamb, and teaches that every ordained priest is to follow the same sacrifice in the exact same way. Christ also bids farewell to his followers and prophesizes that one of them will betray him and hand him over to the Roman soldiers.

In the evening - because Passover began at sundown the Holy Thursday Liturgy takes place, marking the end of Lent and the beginning of the sacred "Triduum," or three, of Holy Week. These days are the three holiest days in the Catholic Church. This Mass stresses the importance Jesus puts on the humility of service, and the need for cleansing with water, a symbol of baptism. Also emphasized are the critical importance of the Eucharist and the sacrifice of Christ's Body, which we now find present in the consecrated Host and Chalice. At the conclusion of the Mass, the faithful are invited to continue Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament just as the disciples were invited to stay up with the Lord during His agony in the garden before His betrayal by Judas. After Holy Thursday, no Mass will be celebrated again in the Church until the Easter Vigil celebrates and proclaims the Resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ.



Good Friday - Fasting & Abstinence

Good Friday is one of two days prescribed by the Church for FASTING and ABSTINENCE (the other being Ash Wednesday). By fasting and abstaining from meat, we show reverence for Christ's sacrifice on the cross for our sake and we show repentance for our sins. We deny ourselves in a small way, just as Jesus denied himself in a great way by giving up his life for our salvation.

FASTING: All Catholics aged 18–59 are obliged to fast. One full meal may be taken, as well as up to two smaller meals which combined do not equal that of a full meal. Note that those who are suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes, women who are pregnant or nursing, and those who are sick are exempt from fasting. In all cases common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.

ABSTINENCE: All Catholics aged 14 and up are obligated to refrain from eating meat.

Collection - Good Friday – March 29th, 2024

A collection will be taken for the Needs of the Church in the Holy Land. This collection is requested by the Holy See to help maintain the Church's holy places in the Holy Land, so important to the faith of Christians everywhere, and also to support the faithful who struggle to survive under political and economic oppression and persecution. A special envelope is included in the boxed set of collection envelopes. Otherwise, please use your own envelope or a "Visitor Envelope" please print your name and complete address.

Divine Mercy Novena

On Good Friday, 1937, Jesus requested that Saint Faustina make a special novena before the Feast of Mercy, from Good Friday through the following Saturday. He, Himself, dictated the intentions for each day. By means of a specific prayer she was to bring to His Heart a different group of souls each day and thus immerse them in the ocean of His mercy, begging the Father – on the strength of Jesus' Passion - for graces for them (See 1209). Since Saint Faustina was commanded to write down the novena. Our Lord must have intended the novena to be used by others, too. Once published, it immediately became very popular, and people prayed the novena, not only in preparation for Mercy Sunday, but at other times as well. The wide range of intentions, which do not include personal needs, makes the great popularity of this novena all the more astounding. In this novena, we truly make the Lord's intentions our own - a beautiful expression of the Church's privilege and duty, as the Bride of the Lord, to be the intercessor at Christ's side on the throne of mercy.

Easter Vigil - Holy Saturday - Mar.30th,

Although celebrated Holy Saturday evening, it is the dramatic Easter vigil liturgy that marks the beginning of Easter. We are awaiting our master's return with our lamps full and burning, so that he will find us awake and seat us at his table (cf. Luke 12:35ff). All Catholics should try to attend this beautiful service.

Light conquers darkness The vigil opens with a service of light. Like the Jewish Passover, our Easter celebration coincides with the beginning of spring, when the sun offers new warmth and

earth is ready to flower again. Our words "lent" (from the Middle-English word for spring, "lengthening days") and "Easter" (possibly Germanic or Anglo-Saxon in origin, signifying "the east", "the rising sun") point to the long tradition of seeing this holy mystery through signs of the natural world. The lighting of the fire and the Easter candle go back to rites that long preceded Christianity. The candle, carried with loving reverence and lyrically praised in word and song, is a sign of Christ, "the light of the world," and celebrates the victory of light over darkness that humanity has ever longed for. God's love endures forever A series of readings recalls the great interventions of God in history, from creation to the redemption of Israel from Egypt, and ends with the story of Jesus' resurrection. The great "alleluia" proclaims with quiet joy the triumph of God's Son. Those preparing for Baptism then celebrate the Sacrament; those to be received are welcomed and then this entire group celebrates the Sacrament of Confirmation. The blessed water sprinkled over others signifies the blessing of new life. Rejoice! This night says as it brings before us the deepest symbols of our hopes and fears. The darkness, sign of evil and death, has been overcome by light. A lamp, a candle has been lit; a fire is enkindled in our hearts; a nourishing water flows through our lives; a baptism destroys what is unclean and brings to life again. Rejoice! this night says to all creation. The Word who made all things, as a new Adam, freshly proclaims God's promise of life. All creation celebrates God's love.

Pope Francis on Holy Week

As we draw near to the end of Lent, we begin to look to Holy Week, in which we will remember the Lord's passion and resurrection. Approaching this most sacred time of the year, we look back to the advice the Holy Father gave for last year's Holy Week.

The pope noted how many people today who walk down the street appear sad, focused "only on their cell phones, but without peace, without hope."

He urged people to eliminate "useless things that are substitutes for hope" during Holy Week to focus on the true source of hope found in Christ.

"During these holy days, let us draw near the Crucified One. Let us place ourselves before him ... to take an honest look at ourselves, removing whatever is superfluous. Let us let Jesus regenerate hope in us," Pope Francis said.

"This is needed: to go back to the heart, to the essentials, to a simple life, stripped of many useless things, which are substitutes for hope. Today, when everything is complex and we risk losing the plot, we need simplicity, to rediscover the value of sobriety, the value of renunciation, to clean up what pollutes the heart and makes us sad," he said.

Pope Francis also highlighted how Jesus did not cover up or hide his wounds when he was nailed to the cross.

"Brothers and sisters, we too are wounded—who isn't in life? And many times, with hidden wounds that we hide out of shame. Who does not bear the scars of past choices, of misunderstandings, of sorrows that remain inside and are difficult to overcome? But also of wrongs suffered, sharp words, unmerciful judgments?"

"God does not hide his wounds, that pierced his body and soul, from our eyes. He shows them so we can see that a new passage can be opened with Easter: to make of our own wounds, holes of light."

By offering forgiveness and love from the cross, Jesus "converts evil into good" and "sorrow into love," he said.

"So today, let us look at the tree of the cross so that hope might germinate in us, that we might be healed of sadness ... It takes a little hope to be healed of the sadness we are sick with, to be healed of the bitterness with which we pollute the Church and the world," he said.

"Brothers and sisters, let us look at the crucifix ... our hope is there." — catholicnewsagency.com
